There are different protocols to follow, especially concerning:

Referencing (identifying the source of information)

Quotations (citing something that was said or written by someone else) – important to avoid plagiarism

Footnotes (to provide further information, explanation or definition)

Bibliography (the web sources or book sources or media sources used in the text)

Layout (language, page numbering, spacing, etc.)

Policy Paper Format

I recommend size 12 font with 1.5 interspacing (Format / Paragraph / Interline).

- European English (UK / Royaume Uni) unless requested to use American English. Don't mix the two! (ctrl A – rather than using the mouse)
- Number the pages not including the Cover Page and Contents Page
- Cover page
 - Your Name (English style. David Rees, not REES, David)
 - Your student number
 - The ESSCA logo
 - The course title and teacher's name
 - The date (or month and year)
 - The title of your Policy Paper

Correct English

- Use your computer to avoid language errors. Select all the document (written or to be written) by using ctrl A.
- Different software have different ways of correcting the language and punctuation.
- If a word is incorrect, it will be underlined in red. Click right on the word to see the possible corrections.
- If a word is underlined in blue, there is a grammatical or punctuation error.
- If the word is not in the computer's memory, you can add the word to the memory for future use.
- To add a link, select Insertion / Hyperlien (useful for your bibliography)
- For language and grammar correction, see the guidelines from Microsoft

Contents Page

After the Cover Page, you should have a separate **summary of the contents** which would normally include: Introduction, Content (divided into different parts) and a Summary or Conclusion (which should include your personal opinion / thoughts about the subject) and a bibliography.

Each part of the Summary should indicate the page number concerned.

For example:

Contents

Introduction	1
Karl Marx and Cultural Hegemony	2
Cultural Hegemony in the 21 st Century	4
Media Control in France	6
Conclusion	8
Bibliography	9

References

When you make a statement, the reader needs to know where the information came from.

For example:

He was also a great speaker – most notably in his speech to the House of Lords in 1945 (Keynes, 1945) concerning the lamentable terms of the American loan to the Britis Rovernment.

The reference (Keynes, 1945) will refer back to the bibliography where the reader can find the full reference with the editor etc.

NB. ChatGPT does not reference unless asked to do so!

Only include the family name and date

References

Any confirmation needs referencing.

Spot where referencing is needed.

FootNotes

Insert a footnote to provide further information, a definition or an explanation. (Insertion, note de bas de page). Not 'Insertion, pied de page). The number will change automatically.

For a Policy Paper, the note is at the bottom of each page, not at the end of the paper. It is inserted automatically by the computer.

For a chapter in an academic book, the note is provided at the end of the chapter.

Quotations

Make it easy to see that you are quoting someone, so that it is not seen as plagiarism

"We had no respect for traditional wisdom or the restraints of custom. We lacked reverence... for everything and everyone". (Rosenbaum, 1995, p. 95).

The reference to Resenbaum, 1995, p.95 will be found in the bibliography.

When **quoting**, make the quotation easy to identify. This is often done by indenting (left margin moved to the right) and / or by using italics. This is important so that the reader can see that it's not plagiarised, but a quotation from someone else. **For example**:

Only include the family Name, date and page number

Quotations. Example.

Keynes did not believe that a Smithian 'invisible hand' would automatically correct the economy – invisible, perhaps, because it does not exist. Keynes understood that market forces will not provide the economy and hence society with what it requires.

"It is the well-being of human beings and human society that lie at the heart of Keynesian economics. This comes very close to the socialist belief that the economy should serve men, not men the economy... It should be not the greed of the few but the needs of the many that are the driving rationale for economic decisions" (Hoerber, 2017).

But, although convinced of the social, political and economic importance of full employment, and a somewhat unhappy member of the Liberal Party, he opposed the Labour Party of the day as much as he opposed the Conservatives.

Bibliography

The bibliography should be in alphabetical order (for an Assignment / Policy Paper) or can be in chronological order for a book or book chapter with different sections.

Do **not** simply provide a link such as: https://www.nytimes.com/2011/03/25/opinion/25krugman.html

since the reader doesn't know what is the content or the author, so do it like this:



Bibliography

There are different protocols for making your bibliography. You can choose the protocol that you like, but always use the same protocol for the whole bibliography.

I recommend using Google Scholar. Once you have found your reference, go to 'citer' to choose the protocol you are going to use

Bibliography with Google Scholar




Bibliography with Google Scholar




Choose one of these protocols and always use the same. 'Harvard' is not available on Google Scholar.

Write a short text with a title, your name and group (2 or 3) (without a cover page and contents list). Following these guidelines:

UK English

- Size 12
- Interline 1.5
- Include 2 footnotes
- Include 2 references
- Include 1 quotation
- Include page numbering
- Include a bibliography (including the references and quotation) using one of the protocols proposed by Scribbr or Google Scholar
- Include at least one web reference in the bibliography
- Record it as a pdf
