



Should we fear a weakening of the Good Friday agreements and the establishment of a harder border?

The protocol



 This allows Ireland to retain its place in the European single market and in the customs union

Avoids the establishment of a physical border

• It impacts the course of goods controls



The critics

- Difficulties in the supply of goods to Northern Ireland from the UK
- Creating a customs border in the Irish Sea.
- More administrative formalities
- Some companies have not had enough time to adapt





The critics

This protocol is highly controversial in Northern Ireland:

- it is mostly supported by nationalists
- it provoked the anger of the unionists





On the side of the Republic of Ireland,

The Republic of Ireland is one of the European Union countries most affected by Brexit:

- 200,000 jobs depend directly on trade with the United Kingdom.
- Dependent on UK for imports
- Complications in fishing





Conclusion



Fears of a return of conflicts and tensions between the two Irelands may have appeared

Ireland is now faced with the **challenge of adapting** to this new way of functioning.
