

What is lobbying?

 An attempt to influence policy makers to adopt certain solutions that are advantageous or non detrimental to a particular group or interest.

Chemical industry (150 groups), food & drink sector (140 groups), and agriculture & fisheries (88 groups) are the biggest lobbying sectors.

- Founded in Barmen in 1863

Bayer AG lobbying

- Registered 17/12/2008 in the EU transparency register
- Lobbying budget between 4.250.000 and 4.499.999 euros
- 20th biggest lobbying turnover
- 5 EP accredited consultants
- 40 meetings with european commission
- Active on european, global, national & regional levels
- 30 lobbyist that are either in-house or consultants

Recent case of Bayer lobbying

 End of 2020, the European commission engaged to stop the exportation of pesticides forbidden to use in Europe

 The problem is that those exported pesticides forbidden to use in Europe come back under the form of fruits & vegetables from countries that use them.



Recent case of Bayer lobbying

 However countries and industrials use the recent trade agreements (CETA & Mercosur) to apply pressure on the EU commission.

 Some countries are USA, Canada & Brazil, companies are Bayer-Monsanto, BASF and Syngenta.

 They ask for exceptions called « import tolerance » as they claim being partners

 Both countries and companies work hand-in-hand by meeting european commission members and filling complaints to the WTO on the grounds of commercial damage



Outcomes



- Using those recent agreements was smart.
- It creates an impotence of the European commission to take convincing and concrete mesures as it fears the hand-inhand work of industries and countries to apply pressure on trade.
- Until now, Bayer is the winner as it is still able to produce and export its toxic products over the world.
